Coastal access - new regulations in force

Coastal access - the next steps

Natural England will start preparations this year to deliver improved coastal access in a number of further areas - Cumbria (Whitehaven to Silecroft); Dorset (Portland, Rufus Cove to Lyme Regis); Kent (Folkstone to Camber); Norfolk (Sea Palling to Hopton on Sea) and Hartlepool (Hartlepool to Speeton).
